
- 1. Know Your Risk
- 2. Get Screened
- 3. Know What is Normal for You
- 4. Make Healthy Lifestyle Choices

The new BSA message was created to better encompass all aspects of an individual's breast health and awareness. The four steps in the new BSA message offer more information and tools for women to use to take care of themselves. These new recommendations will be featured on a new BSA shower card. The new BSA card will continue to include the

Warrior: Jim W. West 10 Year Survivor Spirit of Hope: Cancer Survivors Making a Difference

In 1997, Jim was diagnosed with prostate cancer and that began a life changing commitment of advocacy for men like him who are fighting the disease. By the spring of 2007, Jim was making frequent trips to Tallahassee to advocate for the cause. He testified before committees and lobbied state legislators to pass a bill mandating insurance coverage for prostate cancer screening and early detection. The bill passed in the 2007 Senate legislative session, but failed to pass through the House healthcare committee. Jim is gearing up to fight the fight all over again in the next legislative session. Today he passionately educates men about the importance of early detection for prostate cancer. Jim is the recipient of an Advocacy of Excellence Award from the American Association

of Clinical Urologists and the Florida Urological Society for his courage and advocacy for patients in the State of Florida. He has been highly recognized for his dogged pursuit of prostate cancer education, awareness and screening.

Barbers Against Prostate Cancer Capstone Dinner

Barbers Against Prostate Cancer (BAPC) is a joint research project between TBCCN, the Community Health Advocacy Partnership (C.H.A.P.) of East Tampa and Moffitt Cancer Center. The pilot project demonstrated the feasibility of using trained barbers and barbershops to successfully disseminate prostate cancer information and raise awareness about the disease among African American men. In order to recognize the achievements of the barbers who participated in the program, we held a BAPC Capstone Event Dinner on Thursday, October 30th.

The program began with an introduction by Dr. B. Lee Green. Next, Dr. Juan Luque presented the Written by John Luque, PhD, MPH

project findings to the attendees, highlighting the achievements of the program, such as the increased prostate cancer knowledge demonstrated by the barbers following the training workshops. Next, the following barbers received recognition plaques: Joe

Demoulin, Damien Mosley, Emerson Tillman, Franklyn Radix, Willie Miller, Elton McDaniels, Phil Walker, and Lefonso Ray. ↑



Findings from the Colorectal Cancer Pilot Project

Our pilot study entitled "Colorectal Cancer in Ethnic Subgropus of U.S. Blacks: Exploring Disparities" (U01CA 114627-03S1) assesses perceptions of colorectal cancer and self-reported screening among three subgroups of blacks. Using community-based participatory methods, a total of 62 participants (22 U.S.-born/African Americans; 20 Caribbean-born; and 20 Haitian-born) responded to in-depth qualitative interviews and brief surveys. We found low levels of knowledge, risk perception or worry about colorectal cancer and low self-reported use of colorectal cancer screening across all three subgroups. However, the Haitian-born subgroup Written by Gwede Clement, PhD

reported lower knowledge, lower use of FOBT and sigmoidoscopy or colonoscopy, and lower rates of physician recommendation for screening compared to the other two subgroups. For example, only 55% of Haitians had ever heard about FOBT compared to 84% for English Caribbean and 91% for African American. Similarly, 15% of Haitian-born had ever had a colonoscopy compared to 47% and 50% for English Caribbean and African American, respectively. Findings from this project are being used to inform innovative culturally tailored programs to reach US and foreign-born Blacks. ↑

Cervical Cancer Beliefs in Ethnic Subgroups of Latina Immigrants Written by John Luque, PhD, MPH

"Cervical Cancer Beliefs in Ethnic Subgroups of Latina Immigrants" is the title of Dr. Juan Luque's new NCI funded research project. As the Hispanic immigrant population increases in the U.S., there is growing recognition that interventions need to be tailored to Hispanics of different national origins and educational levels. This study proposes to gain a better understanding of knowledge, risk perceptions, and cultural attitudes among various Hispanic subgroups around cervical cancer in order to develop more effective outreach efforts and impact cervical cancer disparities. The study examines Hispanic beliefs toward cervical cancer and HPV, in order to inform the development of lay health adviser (promotora) curriculum modules. In addition, this project builds on existing TBCCN collaborations by partnering with the mobile clinic arm of Catholic Charities (Catholic Mobile Medical Services and Sister Sara Proctor), and Dover Community Health Center for participant recruitment.
